

Navigating the Nave The Rector's Reflections

LISTENING → PRAYING→ HEALING

All Saints' begins anew an ancient practice of regularly listening and praying for one another's healing and wholeness. Beginning later in August, there will be a Listen/Pray/Healing station at the side chapel during the distribution of communion at 10:00 a.m. People may come over before or after they have received communion where a member of the Unction Team will listen and pray with you for healing. Praying with and for others for the healing and wholeness of life is as ancient as religion. A faith community that is mature in spirituality can hold space for both corporate worship and individual prayer. We can pray for one another as we are able to listen to, respect the dignity of, and grow in concern for one another. We will continue to offer healing prayers during the 8:00 a.m. service at the communion rail as we are aware of the needs.

The Unction Team is made up of Mother Kelli Grace, Father Ryan, Andrea Briggs, and Jim Boyer. Each have extended training in pastoral care, and have the gifts needed to hold space for listening and finding words of comfort and sacred care. We'll rotate through the Sundays.

Brief Request: When you come to the side chapel, please briefly name what/for whom you are seeking prayer.

For You or Another: You can ask for prayers for yourself, someone you know, a world condition, or social concern. Whatever weighs on your heart can be offered up for prayer.

Praying Over You: Once the request is known, the anointer will offer prayers with you and over you. They may touch your shoulder softly or make the sign of the cross on your forehead. Often the words are similar to "May the Great Healer enter your (or, "your Aunt Mary's) mind, body, and spirit and heal you ("your loved one") of all that harms you. May this healing be beyond what we can imagine or expect, and may it bring you full respite and strength."

When: If you sit closer to the front of the church, receive communion, then come over. If you sit towards the back of the church, you may want to first come to the side chapel, then take communion. If there are people waiting at the side chapel when communion is finished, we may wait in silence as all are prayed over, or we may continue on with the service while the prayer station finishes up.

Sacred Communications: While this type of prayer station is offered individually it is also offered in the context of our corporate worship. It is confidential in nature and communal in experience. Your prayer requests are kept confidential even as the whole of the community joins in praying you through. We hold space for one another by giving room for vulnerability and by giving strength through our common prayers.

Not Wedded to the Outcome: As with all times of prayer, this listening and healing station aims to open up a conversation with God and to open our own eyes, hearts, minds to the many ways God is the Great Healer. We often do not know how God will use our prayers, but we do affirm C.S. Lewis's words "My prayer does not change God. But it changes me." We, therefore, keep open to how, when, and where healing takes place.

As we gain experience with this type of sacramental offering, we may change things up a bit. We are imagining how a more extended time of prayer could be offered immediately after Mass, and whether more than one station might be needed. However you find yourself in this House of Prayer, know your prayers are heard and heeded.

Junior Wardens' Notes

It got really hot in July and the burst of activity required to repurpose some of the spaces on our church campus subsided. Not that the project has

been completed – there is still some patching and painting to do and we plan to replace all the florescent lights in the south wing with more energy efficient LED bulbs. We recently learned that the change from florescent to LED can be accomplished without having to replace the fixtures – a real money saver. We have also ordered smart thermostats for our kitchen and choir room. Once those arrive and are installed all the air conditioning controls on campus will have been upgraded to allow more precise and efficient use of the energy we consume.

In commenting on the energy we consume, astrophysicist Neal deGrasse Tyson once said in a television inter-

view that if space aliens ever visited our planet, they would be astounded by our choice of fossil fuel as the primary, and in most cases the only path to energy generation. It's dirty, it pollutes, and its use has heated the earth to the point where species extinction, our species' extinction, is a real threat. Fossil fuel extraction and processing often results in the creation of sacrificial zones – areas around the world where the wellbeing and health of the land, and every creature on it, is sacrificed so that fossil fuels can be exploited for energy. Our visiting aliens would note that while all this is happening, we are swimming in a sea of clean energy from our radiant sun, the winds and heat of the earth, and the motion of the seas. These sources of energy can be harnessed with much less damage, and our visitors might leave befuddled, or maybe even disgusted, by what we are not doing to take care of ourselves, of each other, and of God's creation.

Most of us, this writer included, haven't made much of an effort to understand the energy chain. Like the food chain, the energy chain just happens for us. It's as if the grocery store provides our food, and the switch on the wall provides the energy to light up our rooms. If it were that simple our stewardship of creation would be easy. But that is not the case. Like our food, the energy we consume travels long distances, sometimes hundreds of miles, before it lands in our community. And all the while much cleaner energy that we don't consume surrounds us.

So, what is stopping us from gathering the benefits of all that abundant clean energy? That's a million dollar question and its answer might require a hard look inward, and an analysis of where our individual and collective priorities lie. Want more information about energy transmission and associated social justice issues? Or are you looking for a good non-fiction summer read? If either of those is the case, try **Revolutionary Power**, by Northwestern University law professor **Shalanda Baker**. It's a real eye opener.

Some come simply to be in the presence of God.



Outreach Ministries

Our volunteer work at St. Michaels's continues to evolve. In June our small but mighty crew of volunteers logged in fifty-seven hours of service. This includes pick up, sorting and bagging food and handing it out to persons in line. One hundred and ninety families were served during the June Food Share. These volunteer hours also involve picking up donations of bags of clothing, recyclables, and toiletries on other days. Last month Rob Lennox used his newly painted "Moby Dick" truck to help a St. Michael's volunteer pick up her moving boxes and bring them to her new place of living. We recently have been blessed with donations of some "exotic" foods such as jackfruit, watermelon radishes and 4' celery stalks (with roots attached). We always end up doing a search on the internet just to be sure of the preparation.

The lines between volunteers and patrons are clearly diminishing as we move towards a family atmosphere where we celebrate birthdays of anyone present with a cupcake and loud singing. Patrons are coming early to help us unload boxes off the truck and set them out on tables for us. There are many genuine smiles on those days.

Laundry Love continues to be a valuable service once a month. Summertime has left the volunteer corps a little diminished but new people have been stepping up to help! The **Sunday Advocacy Table** is evolving and is now taking up 1 and 1/2 Tables! There are constant new ideas and information to share about taking care of God's Creation.

Last week a new federal mental health bill went into effect and 988 became a new alternative emergency number for persons experiencing mental health issues across the USA.

The State of California, along with four other states, has proposed legislation to provide professional on site personnel to assist law enforcement in emergency situations (Miles Hall LifeLine Act AB988). This proposed legislation is moving forward due to the overwhelming response and support of citizens. Twenty-one families at All Saints' showed their support by signing letters and contacting their local representatives last month. Thank you for making a difference!

Current topics at the Advocacy Table include: information on potential rate increases on solar in homes and small businesses, information on 80 cooling centers in Riverside County, and support for Ukraine with a hand crocheted sunflower pin given out for each donation.

There are many ways we can continue to care for God's Creation. Stay tuned and find one that works for you.

Fabled Saints of Summer

During the summer of 1980, I would normally leave my abode in the forest above Göttingen and walk down into town through the park along a creek, to return to the university. This particular midsummer day it was pouring rain. So, I boarded the bus to take me into town. As other passengers got on board along our route, mostly Frauen on their way to the marketplace, they were shaking their heads in disbelief, talking up a storm. It was June 27, Siebenschläfertag, Seven Sleepers Saints Day. And it certainly was Seven Sleepers weather.

Legend has it that if it rains on Siebenschläfertag, it will rain for the next forty days. The previous winter had been gloomy enough in Göttingen; months had passed before we saw the sun. The clouds and rains apparently were fated to return. And return they did for the next seven weeks until September. With every day of rain that summer, I pondered the sainthood of the Seven Sleepers.

The Seven Sleepers of Ephesus first appear in western chronicles around the year 500. St. Gregory of Tours (538-594) often praised them. By the 13th century they were commemorated throughout Germany and beyond, recorded in the Golden Legend Book of Saints. The details of their legend differed in the 200 different manuscripts across nine different languages where they were named. The Seven Sleepers were even mentioned in the Qur'an (18-9-26), where they were known as "the companions of the cave."

Once upon a time there were seven Christian youths fleeing persecution, because they refused to revere the Roman gods. They gathered their worldly goods together and gave them to the poor. They then retreated into a cave to pray, where they fell asleep. Apprised of their location, the Emperor ordered the cave be sealed.

Three centuries passed until one day a local landowner opened a cave to use it as a barn. To his surprise the seven youths were sleeping there. When the youths awoke and journeyed into town, they were amazed to see Christian churches everywhere. And local merchants were astonished when the youths tried to buy food with 300-year-old coins. A bishop arrived to ascertain the

facts. He confirmed their story. Shortly afterwards the saintly seven sleepers passed over into Heaven, singing God's praises.

This legend has parallels in other parts of Europe too. The Seven Sleepers are observed in Denmark, Sweden, and a few days later in Norway. There are similar stories all across central Europe on behalf of different saints on different dates in summer. Whenever it rains on those particular feast days, the rains remain for weeks on end, so they say. There is the case of St. Swithun, who had been elevated Bishop of Winchester Cathedral in 852. St. Swithun's Day is celebrated in England on the 15th of July. If the rains fall that day on St. Swithun's bridge, the rains will continue on for forty more, the legend says.

Meteorologists today undo these fables with explanations of the North Atlantic Atmospheric Oscillation from Iceland to the Azores and the battling air pressure gradients fighting to control summer weather over northern and central Europe. But once upon a time the liturgy of the saints carried its influence down into the weather forecast. It is not that saints were thought to cause the weather. Instead, they were harbingers to remind their followers of what we cannot control, rain or shine. The saints at least could warn us of what might come.

Which would you prefer? To read the pressure gradients on the weather map or to dwell in a different frame of mind altogether, reflecting on the lives of saints we honor during the different days of summer, and remembering some saints' dates can mark off turning points of drought or flood? Would you prefer to spend your summer days centered on the saints or centered on the Weather Channel?

Try to remember those days of the summer when life was slower and towns were smaller. Try remember the saints who would call us, to honor their feast days during the week. Try to remember and if you remember, then follow, follow. (With apologies to the Fantasticks)



THE CHEECH: A WORLDWIDE HOME FOR CHICANO ART

Joining the RAM family just six weeks ago is The Cheech Marin Center for Chicano Art & Culture. A public-private partnership between the Riverside Art Museum, the City of Riverside, and comedian Cheech Marin -- one of the world's foremost collectors of Chicano art -- The Cheech will be the center of Chicano art, not only for painting, but for sculpture, photography, and video arts.

The current exhibit, "Cheech Collects," runs through June of 2023. It weaves a story of Marin's efforts as a passionate collector, exploring the making of a major collection from the first works acquired through the most recent acquisitions. This inaugural exhibition is a celebration of the foremost champion of the Chicano School of Art. Unflinching in his faith and commitment

to the excellence of this art, Marin does not bother with past debates on the legitimacy of this art movement but dares to posit that it is the most significant American art movement to date. Marin's efforts have brought unprecedented attention to Chicana/o art. The creation of The Cheech Marin Center for Chicano Art & Culture furthers his advocacy and will continue to shape the art world's perceptions and understanding of Chicano art. The inaugural exhibition features over 100 works and reflects a 40-year span of art production.

The Cheech Marin Center for Chicano Art & Culture of the Riverside Art Museum is located at 3581 Mission Inn Avenue, Riverside, on the corner of Mission Inn Avenue and Orange Street. Metered street and lot parking is available along Mission Inn Avenue. Hours are Monday-Sunday, 10am-5pm, closed Tuesdays in August, open until 8pm on August 4 and subsequent "First Thursdays."



- **4. Endowment Report** Kurt Marcks
 - a. Kairos Mission and Ministry Fund Balance \$81,038 (down 11% year to date)
 - b. All Saints' Foundation \$27,055 (down 9% year to date) (started 2016 by Fr. John & Shannon Conrad)
 - c. Vestry Reserve Fund \$176,361 (down 10% year to date) (established 2021 and includes Curate fund)

The committee recommends that \$1,200 disbursement from the All Saints' Endowment be made to purchase and place a memorial in the labyrinth in thanksgiving for our coming through the pandemic. Parishioners need to see our endowment program in action. Tangible results from the use of endowment funds will encourage giving to the endowment program.
