


Note From the Senior Warden

Dear saints,



Love Thy Neighbor as Thyself

Loving your neighbor as yourself is yet another apparently impossible Christian burden, like living a life of ceaseless prayer. Compassionate love extends beyond the traditional Judaic mandates to care for widows and orphans, to feed the poor, share the wealth, comfort the afflicted and the imprisoned, to welcome strangers. As Jesus practiced it, love has no limits. Acts of compassion toward family, friends, next-door neighbors or perfect strangers grow love selflessly. And the grieving that so often accompanies actively caring for the suffering of others are sorrows we share with Jesus --love's growing pains. Jesus wept, and so do we.

Blair was on our parish prayer list, ever since her metastasized breast cancer was first detected in the autumn of 2020. She was my neighbor across the street. Blair and Howard moved into their home around the same time Susan and I moved into ours, 32 years ago. Blair joined Susan and an assortment of neighbors to form a women's group who met regularly for lunch or simply conversation. Early on, her teenage son taught me to swim, something I had long resisted since drowning as a toddler. When Susan and I adopted our two children from China, Blair and Howard were joyfully supportive. As a Cal art major Blair enthusiastically helped Susan design impossible creations: a fifteen-foot dragon for Chinese New Year, a useable chest-of-drawers costume for my daughter's role in RCT in "Beauty and the Beast." For many years, Blair and Susan together cooked up crops of tomatoes, garlic, onions, and herbs to prepare pasta sauces for the winter.

Blair lived in continual pain from failed back surgeries, incurred from her work in special ed. After her husband died, twenty years ago, she began to travel over the backroads of Europe with a neighbor or to take summer courses in art history at Oxford, where she discovered a mistake in the received tradition of Oxford architecture. An Oxford journal published her correction. Twice Blair saved my life while my family was traveling, when severe cardiac arrhythmia attacked me in the dead of night. Blair told me, when I called her, that she could get me to the ER faster than an ambulance could.

When the cancer was detected, Team Blair was formed from the women's group to help her through surgery, radiation, chemo treatments, all of which failed to stop the cancer's spread but made Blair very ill. My wife Susan and my daughter Anna were with her nearly every day over those two years as were several Team members, spending time with her, watching movies together, taking her to doctors or doing what she could no longer do anymore for herself at home, as her strength failed and her oxygen needs grew once her chest kept filling up with cancerous fluids in those final weeks. Those last two days, along with her devoted son, we kept watch over her in the hospital until she died.

This story is not unique. Grief that comes from witnessing suffering goes hand in hand with loving acts of compassion. This grief is well known at All Saints, made all the worse in recent years by the Covid pandemic and the deaths of so many of our beloved members. We are called to love others as ourselves, and we try to do so. It is then when we experience Jesus's longsuffering wisdom: love hurts, love grows. Millennia ago in a barn in Bethlehem, Mary and Joseph discovered this truth, as every parent does, with a crying baby sorely in need of love without limit. Look around toward your family and friends, look toward your neighbor, look toward the stranger. It has always been our human fate to suffer. Only selfless love can overcome such suffering, making us better persons than we ever thought we could be.

Laundry Love Riverside was ready for a cold and windy night at our event on Wednesday November 16th. We



set up inside the laundromat to protect ourselves from the elements outside.

We served 35 families to complete approximately 330 loads of laundry and spent a total of \$523.69.

There were 12 returning volunteers and 4 new volunteers. Welcome to Sandy Irvine and, from St. Mark's Upland, Fr. Keith Yamamoto, Rosalyn Foster and Greg Foster.

Laundry Love Pomona made a generous donation to LLR....THANK YOU!! We also received a \$20 donation from a client who was appreciative of our work.

We gave away 9 jackets and 10 small blankets. There were several children attending and we had plenty of things to keep them busy, including coloring books, candy, and books to read. We had several returning customers waiting for us to start. Nearly all of the washing machines were available to the start of the evening. By 6:30pm, all machines were running and stayed occupied until 8:00pm!

A few stories from the event: One of the single moms that we support through LLR has her baby in the childcare program at the All Saints' Riverside campus. She said her baby loves the program and she's been able to get a job because of the childcare program. Sherri Bradley held her baby for part of the evening while she did her laundry with her school-aged daughter. We also met two new clients (sisters) who came to get their laundry done. There was a third pile of laundry that they brought with them that had a touching backstory. One of the sisters checks in with a homeless person she knows. She drove by to check on him and his dog immediately jumped into her car. She found that her friend needed medical attention and called 911. While he's recovering in the hospital, she brought all his clothes and belongings to wash. She's currently taking care of his dog, too. As KGK reminds us, Laundry Love Riverside events feel like you've "been to church". The November event was no exception. In the spirit of giving this holiday season, please discern how you can support the LLR ministry through donations, volunteering and by your continued

prayers.

Holiday Outreach Ministries

The **Training and Research Foundation** is committed to transforming the lives of children, families, and the community. A Riverside center for infants through 5 years old is located on All Saints'lower level. You can help provide gifts and other needed items for the children, siblings, and families of this child care center during the holiday season. More information about The Training and Research Foundation can be found at their website https://www.trfhs.org/.

Here is how you can help:

1. Starting November 27th, take a tag from the Christmas tree in Smith Hall. On it, you will find information about a child, including gender, age, clothes/shoe sizes, and some suggested items that the child's parents think they might need or enjoy. Choose something to provide; you don't need to get everything on the list but feel free to provide one or more.

Tape the tag you took from the tree to the unwrapped gift and bring it to the Christmas tree at Smith Hall any Sunday between December 4th and December 18th. You can also give donations to Jim Boyer or Paul Johnson. They will collect, collate and deliver the gifts to the child care facility prior to Christmas.

- 2. The child care facility is always looking for gently used clothes for boys and girls, typically ranging in size from 2T to 6T. If you have clothes to donate, you can put them in a bag and give them to Jim or Paul.
- 3. Right now, the facility is looking for several car booster seats. If you have a new or gently used one and would like to donate it, you can contact Paul Johnson at noyyguy2011@gmail.com.

And here's a reminder that the Penny Bowl will be starting up again on Sunday, November 27th! Bring your pennies to earn positive points to support the ministry of your choice and all other change and paper money to earn negative points for the ministry that you'd like "help" get to last place. The winning ministry gets bragging rights and the donations will be used to help fund Christmas presents for the young adults in Project Inspire and to provide additional gifts for the children and families at the child care facility.



Family Promise's new Executive Director Claire Jefferson-Glipa has announced the opening of the Family Promise Day Center January 2, 2023, "to provide Prevention & Diversion, Shelter, and Stabilization to families who are on the verge or are experiencing homelessness."

Our ministry partner Family Promise Riverside is completing its process for offering transitional housing to unsheltered families. One component is their Day Center, where parents can access social services or look for work or permanent housing, and where kids not in school can play. Family Promise is stocking its Day Center pantry with donated goods, and their leaders have invited the good people of All Saints' to participate.

Thank you for the infant and toddler items you donated in October and November; they have been gratefully received. For the month of December, please pick up any of the following items (new or gently used) for children ages pre-K through 6th grade, and bring them to the office. 

Food Share Ministry

The Food Share at St. Michael's continues to grow monthly. In the first two weeks of the month 110 families were served.

Unforeseen circumstances caused the third week to have no available fresh food to distribute. The staff of St. Michael's was informed late the night before that Feeding America would not be able to provide food. The resourceful staff of the church's Food Share raided the canned good shelves in their kitchens and brought out everything they had stocked. Everyone that came received some canned foods and bread the next day. No one left empty handed.

A rather poignant moment ended the day when a group of nine women approached Mother Mary Christ and asked why the communion service that has been regularly held at the Food Share didn't take place beforehand. They were quoted as saying "it wouldn't be right not to praise God for the food he had just supplied." The altar was quickly rolled out and an impromptu service was held. They were grateful for even the meager amount of food that had been provided.

On Thanksgiving day the church held a large turkey dinner for 100 families on site. The food distribution did not take place that day but will resume on December 1st. On that day we will also have baby formula supplied by Riverside County's CAP program and a large quantity of gently used winter clothing for distribution.

We always need recycled paper and plastic bags as well as clothing and blanket donations. You can leave them in the church hall (please mark the bags) or give them to me directly at the 10 am Sunday service. - 4. Endowment Committee Jeannene Kelly
- -Written report submitted by Kurt Marcks, Chair. There have been suggested changes to the Endowment and Investment Fund Policies and Guidelines, the main one being adding the church treasurer as an ex-officio member (non-voting) to the committee. The full document Endowment and Investment Fund Policies and Guidelines is on file)
- -The process of amending the document calls for a vote of at least two-thirds majority of the Vestry at two regularly scheduled meetings. The congregation must be informed within one week after the first meeting.

M/SJohnson/Korzec that we accept and approve amendments to the Endowment and Investment Fund Policies and Guidelines. *Carried* (unanimously)

-Jeannene reviewed each of the funds overseen by the Endowment Committee

The Kairos Mission and Ministry Fund (invested at the Episcopal Church Foundation)

This is the default fund to receive unrestricted bequests left to All Saints'. It is a quasi-endowment managed with the intent on preserving the principle, but can be accessed by the Vestry in cases of significant need.

The All Saints' Foundation (invested at The Diocesan Investment Trust)

This is a true Endowment, begun in 2016 with a \$10,000 gift from Fr. John Conrad and Shannon Murphy. Numerous small donations have since been made to the fund. The fund is designated for specific use and the principle cannot be touched.

The Vestry Reserve Fund (invested in the Balanced Fund of the Episcopal Church Foundation)

This fund opened with church reserves in 2021, with an anonymous gift of \$100,000 as seed money to hire a curate. This fund is followed by, but not overseen by the Endowment Committee.

-The committee recommends disbursement of \$1,200 for a dedication plaque for our labyrinth. M/S

Woodbury/Varner that we accept the Endowment Committee report and approve disbursement of \$1,200. *Carried* **5. Families, Children and Youth** - Leslie Sunderland

- -Sunday School is going really well. Some Sundays have had 25 in attendance. The average is ten or so. Smitha Jetti would like to take on more Sundays.
- -Youth Group has been expanded. This last week the program was based on disabilities and privilege with you enacting everyday activities as if they had various disabilities. Good life lessons learned.
- -Families with Small Children continues to meet online, but a potluck is being planned to meet and share ideas in person,

6. Community Health - Kathy Woodbury

- -COVID cases are still down, but the reality may be that cases are not being reported. Symptoms are that of a bad cold or the flu. Mask and stay home if not well.
- -There have been 198 cases of Monkeypox, 98% of those being male. There is a vaccine available.

7. Hospitality - Kathy Woodbury

- -Oktoberfest was a great success. We had 60 people attending. Ian and youth made the pretzels, Many hands pitched in to decorate, set up, cook, and cleanup. Luke Polling saved the day by going home to get his propane tank. It was suggested that we purchase a second tank to have on hand. We had \$850 in donations, but still have to cover expenses.
- -We have a full calendar for November and December: All Souls Candlelight Service, All Saint's Potluck, Peggy Rose Memorial, Consecration Sunday, Christmas Extravaganza, Advent Carols, Blue Christmas, and Christmas services, lots of opportunities to participate.

8. Outreach - Patricia Korzec

- -Laundry Love continues. Our clients always show up and are appreciative. We can always use volunteers.
- -The number of patrons is increasing, and will increase even more when the St. Michael's housing units open up. Funding for more food is needed and we are exploring ideas to meet that need.
- -We had 60 people participate in Fr. Ryan's communion service this week.
- -Patricia will check with Jim Boyer about Christmas outreach to Path of Life, Inspire, and Giving Tree. Mother Kelli Grace suggested we include Family Promise this year

9. Finance - Jane Carney

- a. Current Financial Report
- -As in years past, congregational giving in September is lower, but Mother Kelli Grace says giving during October looks strong. While we are in the red \$3,000, year-to-date results are better than anticipated in the budget.
- -The audit interview committee has found auditing is not apopular thing now Many smaller CPA firms no longer do audit work. They have found two firms with non-profit experience, one who does the auditing for St. Mark's Episcopal Church in Upland.
- -The committee formed to look into the refinancing of our existing mortgage will begin talking to lenders in November.
- -Owing to Darlene's diligence, All Saints' received \$13,000 from the Carnegie School bankruptcy, and we were able to retain the security deposit.

- b. Budget Committee for 2023
- -Budget Committee will have a draft preliminary budget to present to the Vestry at the November meeting.
- -Vestry Committee will consist of Jane Carney, Mother Kelli Grace Kurtz, Craig Riemer, and Kristin Varner.

10. Stewardship - Kristin Varner

- -The Stewardship Committee has met several times in preparation for Stewardship 2023.
- -We will be using the diocesan program, themed "More Than Enough"
- -November 6th and 13th we will gather 30-45 second, videos from members to "At All Saints' I can see God....."
- -Stewardship Campaign will end on November 20, Consecration Sunday, with a brunch provided by the Youth Group.

11. Senior Warden Report - Francie Johnson

- -Looking forward to composing Stewardship letter to go out in November.
- -Francie worked with Steve in building a wall and installing a door as a noise barrier in the north wing.
- -We are looking for ways to recruit new Vestry members.
- -Plans are underway for a spring musical fundraiser featuring Steve Slaten.

12. Junior Warden Report - Steve Slaten, Luke Polling

-The lease with Inspire Life Skills Training for the white house has been renegotiated, with an annual 2% increase. (copy of lease is on file) Inspire requested a gate between house and church parking lot. There were also concerns about the addition of a community garden on the site (a gate will be added behind the garage to access the garden). This will not affect their use of space. If a proposal for RCC low income housing comes about,

If a proposal for RCC low income housing comes about, Inspire requests that we go to a month to month agreement *M/S Varner/Johnson* that the Vestry approve the First Amendment to Residential Lease All Saints' Episcopal Church, Riverside, Landlord Inspire Life Skills Training, Tenant. *Carried*

- -Sheldon's Air Conditioning performed regular maintenance, but there is a problem with a leak in the kitchen. Repair to cost \$1,000. We may need to get a second opinion, look into new sources for repair and maintenance.
- -PRECIS Solar has provided another option for solar on our campus. It would entail a shade structure over the labyrinth and part of the lawn with panels on structure. It would require no changes to the tile roofing as other estimates do.
- -All Saints' hosted a Care of Creation forum on October 11th, with 40 or so attendees.
- -Ongoing projects continue: installation of smart thermostats, continuation of water-wise landscaping, preparing two offices in the south wing for tenant use, painting of interior and exterior, replacement of hot water source in south wing.

13. Rector's Report - Mother Kelli Grace Kurtz

- -Mother Kelli Grace had lunch with Roy and Enor Harris, Roy has resigned as head usher after 40 years. He has suggested Leslie Sunderland as his replacement. We graciously accept his resignation and express our gratitude.
- -We have two baptisms on November 13th.
- -Andy Cooper, Aspirant for curate, will be joining us on Advent One. He will be here on Wednesdays.
- -Executive Director of Mercy House,manager of St. Michaels Apartment Complex and DeAnza Veterans Housing is developing an advocacy committee in each County. He has asked Mother Kelli Grace to Chair Riverside County. The committee may be interested in south wing office space.
- -We have four Vestry members rotating off in December. The nominating committee will be made up of the Junior and Senior Wardens and two members of the parish. A recruitment notice will be posted in Sunday paper and the Good News.

Slate will be presented to Vestry at the December meeting for approval.

-Hold the date, late January near MLKing Day for the ordination to the priesthood of Deacon Ryan Macias.
