

Note From the Senior Warden

Dear fellow All Saints' parishioners,

The Pilgrimage to the Holy Lands was powerful. We began in the West Bank city of Jerusalem (Palestinian but under Israeli control). South to Bethlehem (Palestinian control). Then east to the Jordan River Valley stopping in Jericho (Palestinian). North to Nazareth (Israeli) and the Sea of Galilee (Israeli). Returning south to Burqin (Palestinian), Nablus (Palestinian) and Tayeb (Palestinian). Then back to Jerusalem. Lots of Israeli checkpoints but no problems crossing. Our guides, Iyad and Rami Qumri (father & son, Palestinian Christians), did a great job guiding us. A few highlights of our journey were:


- An early morning walk in silence through the Old City to the Church of The Holy Sepulchre. Seeing the site of Mt. Calvary, the Stone of Anointing, and the empty tomb without crowds.
- Standing at The Western Wall, separated by gender to pray, touch, and leave paper prayers.
- Waking to the Muslim call to prayer early every morning.
- Standing in the Shepherd's Field and descending into a cave with a manger just as Mary and Joseph did for Jesus' birth.
- Sunrise Eucharist in the desert east of Jerusalem overlooking the Roman road winding through Wadi Qelt the route Jesus walked returning to Jerusalem.
- Wading in the Jordan River while Mother Kellie Grace and Father Peter showered us with river water as we celebrated our Baptismal vows.
- Watching local fishermen pulling onto shore with boxes of fish and nets like those the disciples used. These fishermen added an outboard engine.
- Sunset with a glass of wine on the roof of our guesthouse overlooking Nazareth.
- Banner and posters of Palestinian youth who lost their lives due to conflict.

- Mandatory Israeli conscripts in uniform. Some carrying weapons.
- New ridgeline Jewish settlements on historically Palestinian land.
 - Floating in the Dead Sea.
- Walking the Stations of the Cross on the Via Dolorosa in the Old City. Taking turns reading and carrying a large cross on our shoulders (including my 85 year old mother-in-law, Sara Jane).
- Meals of pita, hummus, cucumbers, tomatoes, onions, falafel, eggplant, grilled meat and strong Arabic coffee.

Last Sunday @ All Saints', the Psalm and readings referred to temples, valleys, the City of Jerusalem. The Pilgrimage was a once in a lifetime experience that enhanced my journey as a Christian. "That we may delight in your will and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name" holds visual meaning for me now.

Junior Warden's Notes

The worst of summer's heat may be behind us, and our daylight hours are shortening. Autumn, southern California style, is just around the corner,

and I think you'll agree that the church campus is looking pretty good, pretty welcoming in fact. I hope that as our Holy Land Pilgrims, and other summer travelers, return they'll have similar thoughts.

Here is a list of building and grounds tasks that have been accomplished since the end of July:

- The backyard at the rectory has been aerated to allow for more efficient watering.
- The bushes in the concrete planters in front of the business office and sanctuary have been removed so that more water-wise plants can take their place.
- A toilet paper holder in the girl's bathroom across from the new childcare room became dislodged from the wall (no one seems to know how that came to be). It has been reattached with screws and anchors.
- A flush valve in that same bathroom had to be replaced.
- The water supply to the bushes paralleling Magnolia has been halted. Those bushes will be removed to allow for more water-wise landscaping.
- The keys to the locks on the metal cage covering the AC equipment near the Smith Hall kitchen door have been missing for some time. The locks were cut off and replaced, and the metal cage received a fresh coat of paint.
- Fluorescent lighting at two locations in the south wing have been converted to the more energy efficient LED type. In the first instance, the fluorescent fixture in the south wing hall closest to the music room was left in place but the ballasts were removed, the fixture rewired, and LED bulbs installed at a cost of less than 30 dollars. Also, the two fluorescent light fixtures in the south wing office across from the music room were moved to the new Quaker library and replaced

with fixtures that came equipped with LED bulbs. The fixtures cost about \$34 each. The old fixtures from the Quaker library were found to be corroded and were tossed out after the ballasts were removed. Ballasts from fluorescent light fixtures, especially the older ones, are considered hazardous waste and need to be handled as such.

- A new welcome sign for our church offices has been installed. The sign consists of separate tiles brought back from the Holy Land by Mother Keli Grace after a previous visit. They were hand painted by an artist in Jerusalem.
- The storage area in Smith Hall, the shed at the west end of Smith Hall, and the janitor's closet near the men's restroom in the breezeway near the Columbarium have all been cleaned and reorganized.

A lot of small tasks were completed over the last sixty days. These small tasks do add up, however, and the end results are rewarding.

Here are a few of the things that need to be addressed over the next sixty days: Continued work on water-wise landscaping, and both interior and exterior painting. We also really need to start planning for our community garden.

The Civil Rights Institute is honoring Inland Empire civil rights historymakers and unsung heroes; celebrating new affordable housing for 72 families; and opening an exhibit of "Still I Rise: The Black IE Fight for Justice." Monday, October 24, is the last day to register to vote for the November 8 General Election. All those registered to vote in California will receive a vote-by-mail ballot, beginning around October 10. The ballot will include seven propositions, plus

- Statewide candidates for U.S. Senate, Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, Controller, Treasurer, Attorney General, Insurance Commissioner, Member of State Board of Equalization, State Superintendent of Public Instruction
- U.S. Representative in Congress, State Senator, State Assembly Member
- Supreme Court Justices, as well as other local candidates and local measures.

You can **return your ballot by mail by Election Day, November 8**, or in person to various locations. The League of Women Voters offers detailed non-partisan information about the election through


All Saints' needs a Team Leader Sunday, March 26, 2023, 1:30pm


In order to participate well in 2023, we need someone to take the lead.

As I grow older, I find myself feeling homesick —not so much homesickness for my childhood or even the dear friends I've lost to death, not for the sweet reminiscences of days past and lost loves, in fact not a nostalgia for the past at all, but a homesickness perhaps for what is to come.

During my most solitary and scholarly years, in Germany, I discovered that the dreams we have the night before keep playing on again throughout the day, if we are quiet enough to listen for their base clef beneath the noise of thoughts and the cacophony of activities. I found from my solitude that if I was open to that silence, I could sometimes retrieve those dreams again in glimpses and notice how they played through my thoughts and feelings of the day.

It occurs to me that all our lives long there have been these visions and voices within, if we only would attend to them. Usually the activities and conversations of our waking days cloud the visions and drown the sounds, but not without leaving an elusive sense that what was seen or heard is still there, but obscured. And as the decades pass, the yearning grows to see those visions and hear those voices more clearly and loudly, to hearken to their abiding presence in our lives. Perhaps that is the homesickness that abides in me and calls to me, as I enter my final years waiting for God.

I love you, gentlest of Ways, who ripened us as we wrestled with you.

You, the great homesickness we could never shake off, you, the forest that always surrounded us,

you, the song we sang in every silence, you dark net threading through us.


All Saints' is located on land once occupied by the Cahuilla people, and some others. Their ancestors are buried on this land and their descendants still live here.




September 4 ~~ The altar flowers were given to the glory of God and in celebration of the life of **Jackie Tavaglione**





Laundry Love Riverside was very busy at our event on Wednesday September 21st. served 39 families to



We had several returning customers waiting for us to begin the event. Nearly all of the washing machines were available to the start of the evening and by 6:15 PM all the machines were running. We needed all 12 of our volunteers to keep up with the demand.

Many of our returning clients happily walked up to our check-in table and asked, "Is this FREE laundry night???" They were pleased and relieved to know that it was, as many of them are struggling financially. I spoke to a few new faces at the laundromat. One woman was completely SHOCKED that we would offer to pay for laundry services for those in need. She asked, "WHY?!? Why would you help me?" We explain that we're here to help those in need and she was overwhelmed and gratefully accepted our services. I also spoke with a Spanish-speaking woman. She was there at the laundromat with her husband and three children (holding one child on her hip all evening). She asked what Laundry Love was and asked if there were other things we could provide for free. She asked if we had food, clothing, or diapers. I told her that we have given away school supplies and clothing before and it depends on when we receive donations. We aren't able to provide give-away items every month. She asked if she could have the scent boosters we had on display. I said yes and she was extremely grateful. I asked if she lived in the neighborhood and she said yes. The family doesn't have transportation and it's a 20-minute walk from their home to the laundromat. They walk everywhere. Her husband was carrying all the laundry baskets and she was taking care of the children. I would imagine that we'll see her and her family again.

In speaking with our returning clients, they mentioned that they had been struggling with the heat we had this past month and they were looking forward to cooler temperatures in the month ahead. One of our regular clients referred a friend from Path of Life and he was very appreciative of our services at the event.

Like many parts of California, Riverside has a complex racial history. Also like many parts of California, the whole of that history is not regularly told.

The first people known to have lived on this land were members of the Cahuilla and Serrano indigenous nations. Early settlers of mixed Mexican and Spanish ancestry followed. Europeans arrived inland in the late 19th century, and, aided by the advent of train transportation, established a city and a profitable citrus industry. Blacks from the southern states began arriving, and groups of Chinese, Japanese and Korean immigrants came, finding work in the citrus groves. Sherman Indian School was established in Riverside in 1901. People from each of these groups would have had stories to tell of challenge and success, of both thriving in this region and the obstacles to thriving. How many of these stories do we tell now?

The Civil Rights Institute of Inland Southern California, opening this month, will promote more of that storytelling. The Civil Rights Institute is a new downtown building, and a non-profit organization, and a dream. Its mission is to assemble, store and disseminate, for educational purposes, narratives and materials concerning civil rights events in Riverside and surrounding areas. According to its website, as the voice of civil rights for inland southern California, the Institute will:

- Provide public programming focusing on civil rights and the region's civil rights history
- Schedule exhibits and performances that support civil rights activities
- House an archive and library of regional civil right materials
- Conduct oral history projects, and support the production of civil rights audio and video productions, and
- Recognize the region's civil rights leaders and their impact.

The building is a 92,000 square foot project located on Mission Inn Avenue, across the street from the new Main Library. In addition to meeting and exhibit space, it is the new home for the Fair Housing Council of Riverside County. As a forward-looking non-profit, the Institute has dedicated its upper floors to 72 units of affordable family housing. This bold move toward local problemsolving, through the inclusion of much-needed housing on the site, suggests an organization already enacting its vision.

One display available for viewing now is the series of pavers on the sidewalks surrounding the new building. Each paver on the Walk of Fame honors a civil rights advocate who lived or worked in inland southern California. The Walk of Fame includes 19th century figures Santos Manuel, John North, and Eliza Tibbets, and familiar names from the 20th century: Dosan Ahn Chang Ho, Jukichi and Ken Harada, Buford Johnson, Mine Okubo, and many others. The whole list is at https://www.inlandcivilrights.org/our-heroes/. A digital version of the Walk of Fame is under development.

The grand opening of the Civil Rights Institute will take place on Saturday, October 22, beginning at 5:30pm. Expect stories to be told, from the past and looking into the future.





1. Call to Order Meeting called to order with prayer by Mother Kelli Grace.

M/S Johnson/Briggs to provide Deacon Ryan Macias with a seat and voice (no vote) at All Saints' Vestry meetings throughout his tenure at All Saints' Episcopal Church. *Carried*

12. Rectors Report - Mother Kelli Grace Kurtz

- -Mother Kelli Grace will be here with us until her vacation in August.
- -In September she will lead a Holy Land Pilgrimage that 20 of our parishioners will be attending.
- -General Convention saw 8-9 days work pared down to 3 ½ days, 8:00 am-9:30 pm.
- -Policies and Procedures regarding archival history and retrieval of Native American artifacts was a major topic, along with Episcopal Boarding Schools. There was much Native American testimony.
- -Puerto Rico may now choose their own Bishop.
- -Seven pieces of Care of Creation legislation were passed, but not all funded.
- -There was an epidemiologist consultant hired to be on hand during the convention. It was projected that 10-12% attending would get COVID. Participants were fully vaccinated and boosted, they were tested every morning, and were fully masked throughout the convention.
- -Bishops Against Gun Violence marched to the site of recent shooting.
- -Revision of the 1979 Prayer Book is under consideration.
- -Five weeks without preaching has allowed Mother Kelli Grace to recenter. She is thankful for time off and delighted to have Deacon Ryan with us now.
- -After much consideration and prayer Mother Kelli Grace will establish a Healing Station. Jim Boyer, Andrea Briggs, (Jim and Andrea have had Clinical Pastoral Education Training) and Deacon Ryan will be available during communion at both services and after service as needed for those needing special prayer. Mother Kelli Grace and Deacon Ryan will be available for 8:00 service.
