

#### Navigating the Nave The Rector's Reflections

**One day...** A young pilgrim arrived at a monastery searching for an elderly pilgrim who was known to be the wisest of them all. In spite of his youth, he had already completed the majority of the well known pilgrimages of the world.

He approached the wise man and asked, "Master, what must I do to become a true pilgrim?"

The elderly man looked into his eyes and felt great compassion for him.

"Son, if you truly wish to be an authentic pilgrim, return to your home with your family, your neighbors and your friends and listen to them, serve them, forgive them and love them. Then you will be a true pilgrim."

The young man laid down his walking stick, turned around and left deeply saddened. He was willing to walk thousands of kilometers even carrying a tremendous amount of weight on his shoulders, but he was unwilling to fulfill what the wise man advised him to do.

Story inspired by the encounter between Jesus and the rich young man.

A pilgrimage: it's not a vacation, or a sightseeing trip, or a shopping trip. It's not a cruise or excursion. It is a journey. A journey to find where God may be found. A journey to discover the central sacredness, the center of being. A journey for being immersed in sacred stories, sacred time, sacred community. Jews, Muslims, and Christians have been traveling to Holy Lands for over two thousand years. Other faith traditions have their version of holy pilgrimage.

It is a great honor to be a chaplain for 20 pilgrims from All Saints' as we travel to the Holy Land. We'll be joined by 20 pilgrims and Father Peter Browning from Saint Andrew's Irvine. Our guides are Iyad, Rami, and Sami Qumir. They are Palestinian Christians who live in Jerusalem and the surrounding area. I trust Iyad and his sons implicitly. His network of "cousins" throughout Israel/Palestine have seen me through four other pilgrimages and I have no doubt they will provide safe passage yet again. We'll stay at Saint George's in Jerusalem and at the Sisters of Nazareth in Nazareth. Saint George's is on Nablis Road, just a short walk to Damas-

cus Gate which opens into the Old City of Jerusalem, leads down through the Muslim Quarter and over to the Church of the Holy Sepulcher. Saint George's is the Cathedral, theological school, and retreat center for the Anglican Archdiocese of Jerusalem and all of the Holy Land. The Sisters of Nazareth is across the road from the Latin Basilica of the Annunciation and next to the Anglican Christ Church where we will worship on Sunday, September 11. The service will be in English and Arabic. We'll renew our baptismal vows in the Jordan River and visit the oldest church in Christendom, the Church of the Holy Nativity in Bethlehem. Nazareth is a unique city in all the world: it is in Israel proper (not Palestine) but the majority of the residents are Arabic. So, Fr. Nael Abu Rahmoun of Christ Church is an Arab Christian with an Israeli passport. It is a great example of what I have experienced so many times, not only in the Holy Land but in life: historical, political, cultural, geographical, and religious/spiritual hard and fast lines are nearly impossible to draw. More often these categories bump into, spill over, argue, parallel, and even mirror each other. It's in the mix, that sometimes messy, tense mix that the Holy can best be experienced. I pray our pilgrims come closer to the presence of the Holy not just in the world, not just in their lives, but in the living they find when they return home. For a pilgrimage is not over until the pilgrims return to their own front door.

Please pray for us pilgrims. Know too, we are praying for you. We will light candles for All Saints' and all the saints at All Saints' wherever we go.


#### **Note From the Senior Warden**





Equinox is Latin for "equal night." The equinox happens twice a year with the vernal or spring equinox on or near March 20 and the autumnal or fall equinox on or near September 22. The day and night are equal in length on these two days. In between the two equinoxs is the winter solstice and the summer solstice- the shortest and longest days of the year, respectively.

The story is told that the architect who designed the All Saints church building had in his imagining of the building where and when the sun sets. He placed the church footprint in such a way that the vesper light would come through the red doors of the church and the rose window above the red doors, down the center isle and hit the altar and the cross as the sun sets at the summer solstice. But this time of year the light coming through all the stained glass windows is just as vibrant; the light dances throughout the building, giving depth and breadth to experiencing the Holy in this place. Whether or not the story is apocryphal, the truth is, being in the church building at sunset this time of year is a sacred experience. It clears the mind, fills the lungs, and moves the soul. This time of year we also highlight creation and our response to all the Creator has given to us, here on earth, our fragile island home. Evening Prayer on the autumnal equinox has become a tradition with unique prayers, sacred stories and song that highlight how creative and imaginative our good and gracious God is and how amazingly wonderful all of creation is, and how profound our role as stewards of creation is.

Please join the All Saints' community on Thursday, September 22, at 6:30 p.m. in experiencing the light show that is the autumnal equinox inside our church building.

#### St. Michael's Food Share

It may be the hottest summer on record but even the extreme heat does not keep people from lining up on Thursday mornings at St. Michael's for the Food Share. The numbers of families fed in August were approximately 265. These numbers are just an estimate because we have several people who take food to distribute to other families in their neighborhood and we also have one women who distributes food to ten senior citizens on a weekly basis.

The Reverend Canon Mary Crist recently started each Food Share day with a *Communion Service* prior to the food distribution. The service is in English and Spanish and occurs at 8am. One of the photos (below) shows her at the homemade altar with the looming construction of the new Homeless/Low Income project in the background. This is the project that many of you spoke in favor of before City Council last year. This is a miracle in progress! Those Thursdays when Mother Mary is not able to be at Saint Michael's, the Reverend Deacon Ryan Macias has stepped in to lead a Deacon's Mass.

Gloria, the cook for St. Michael's, also prepares a *freshly made breakfast* of burritos and hot coffee for all those in

attendance. Our own Diane Askren stepped in to perform the cooking duty one one week when Gloria was absent. Yum! Yum! Thank you, Diane! In the past month this food share has evolved into nourishment of the soul as well as of the body.

We welcome all contributions of plastic bags (thank you Hannigan Family for the donation of 700 red cloth bags), clothing, and toiletries. You can leave the donations in the kitchen or catch me after the 10am Sunday service at the Advocacy Table. New volunteers for our All Saints' Support Team are always welcome. (Thursdays from 8-10am; no heavy lifting)

#### **Advocacy Table**

Check us out after the 10 am Sunday service. In recent weeks we posted info on a *potential new tax for solar installations*, locations of *warm and cool centers* in Riverside County, and a fundraiser for the people of *Ukraine* (monies donated to the Episcopalian fund). Christine Miller created hand-crocheted yellow sunflowers pins as a thank you for donors to the relief effort. To date her grassroots efforts have totaled \$1.800 + in donations!











#### Backyard Birding

"Yellow" by Mary Oliver, 2009

There is the heaven we enter
Through institutional grace
And there are the yellow finches bathing and singing
In the lowly puddle.

In our backyard we have several bird feeders: two large hanging tubes with multiple perches containing wild bird seed, one mesh Niger feeder designed for lesser goldfinches, one hanging dish carrying jelly for hooded orioles, a round mesh container for Sunflower seeds, and a feeder for hummingbirds. We also scatter seed below the feeders for mourning doves, towhees, the occasional piggy pigeons, not to mention regular visits by neighborhood squirrels, and the nightly skunks and possums. All these feeding stations are just a few feet from our large backyard windows, under the shelter of a towering Chinese elm.

Shortly before dawn every morning our two younger indoor cats are always perched by the windows to see the morning show, while the two older cats and humans are still sleeping. The show continues lackadaisically throughout the day, revives vigorously toward sunset, and is then followed by our nighttime visitors, once the birds have left the scene. While we do have occasional exotic birds and migratory birds in transit (including mallard ducks in the swimming pool), the vast majority are finches. When they are in their morning or evening feeding frenzies, there often are over a dozen or more finches going back and forth from station to station, hanging upside down on the sunflower feeder, while orioles peck slowly from their jelly dish as humming-birds sip at theirs.

Whatever else may be happening in our lives, it is a contemplative gift to watch the birds flitting from feeder to feeder, some impatiently waiting for a space to land. The display continues day after day, month after month, in the seasons when male birds are flamboyantly colored to attract their mates and later on when fledges with

furiously flitting wings learn the art of flying and feeding for themselves. During afternoons, when I refill the rapidly emptying seed containers, the birds sit on the wires or on tree branches, chatting loudly among themselves until I have finally left the scene to them, though sometimes I sit perfectly still on a nearby bench to watch. Why is nature so beautiful?

There is also suffering. Occasionally our local Cooper's hawk or red-shouldered hawk will dive down from a hiding place in a larger tree nearby to pluck a dove or take a smaller snack. The birds scatter hither and yon in an instant, but occasionally a small finch is taken. And even when capture fails, a finch might be slammed against the window and fall stunned to the ground. Usually they recover to fly away.

Sometimes a stunned goldfinch will die. As I pick one up, I find he weighs almost nothing, but the details of his delicate feathering and range of coloring hold me in awe at his creation. That very goldfinch had a family, was raised with unfailing care, taught to fly and feed, to sing joyously at dawn with his community of friends. These little yellow birds have each known the presence of God without ever needing to name it.



#### You might want to know . . .

This year Rosh Hashanah is celebrated by our Jewish

siblings from Sunday evening, September 25, through Tuesday, September 27. It is the Jewish New Year, and is the first part of Jewish High Holy Days. Rosh

Hashanah is marked by praying in the synagogue, and the blowing of the shofar, the emblematic ram's horn.

In Scripture, God sets out for Moses a series of festivals and celebrations. Rosh Hashanah is described in Leviticus 23.23-25, "The Lord spoke to Moses, saying: Speak to the people of Israel, saying: In the seventh month, on the first day of the month, you shall observe a day of complete rest, a holy convocation commemorated with trumpet blasts. You shall not work at your occupations; and you shall present the Lord's offering by fire."

Yom Kippur, or the Day of Atonement, is the holiest day of the year in Judaism, and is observed this year from Tuesday evening, October 4, through Wednesday, October 5. The Day of Atonement is described in Leviticus 23.26-32.

There are ten days, called the Days of Awe, between the beginning of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. In Scripture, when Moses came down from Mount Sinai after 40 days with God, carrying the stone tablets on which God had written the Ten Commandments, Moses found the

people worshipping a golden calf. Enraged, he smashed the tablets. God too was enraged at the people; some serious negotiation on Moses' part was required for God to forgive them, and agree to write a second set of tablets (Exodus 33-34).


The practice during the Days of Awe is fasting, confession, and prayer. According to Jewish tradition, on Rosh Hashanah God chooses whether to write each person into the Book of Life for the coming year, and then waits until Yom Kippur to confirm that decision. Jews use this time both individually and collectively to atone for their misdeeds, and to make peace with their brothers and sisters, and with God. The day of Yom Kippur is set aside for further public and private prayer and amendment of life, at the end of which Jews hope they have been forgiven.


